...From Positive Promotions

- 1. Talk with your child, everyday, about his or her school experiences.
- 2. Read the school handbook and all notices that the school sends home.
- 3. Meet your child's teacher and attend Parent/Teacher conferences.
- 4. Consult with your child's teacher whenever you have concerns.
- 5. Attend school events, PTO meetings, and school board meetings.
- 6. Stay aware of your child's academic progress. Praise all earnest efforts and accomplishments.
- 7. Review homework assignments each day and help your child organize time and work.
- 8. Provide learning experiences. Visit museums, watch educational TV shows, and have books and other learning materials available at home.
- 9. Join the school's PTO and participate in its activities.
- 10. Volunteer at school. From classroom assistance to field trips, school events, and fundraisers, there are many opportunities to offer your services.

**REMEMBER** – Your attention and involvement show your child that school is important.


### **Words of Praise**

### **Early Mornings**

Please remember that students are not to be on campus prior to 7:25, when the doors open and supervision begins. Students that arrive before this time are not supervised. Your child's safety is a high priority. As such, we are asking for your support by bringing your child at, or after, 7:25 am. Thank you.



### Walk and Bike to School Day

On October 7th, Howard participated in *International Walk and Bike to School Day*, which is an event focused on physical activity, health, and the environment. Howard had 159 students either walk or bike to school, which is 49% of our school population; up 19% from last year! Way to go! Students that participated earned prizes from Ms. Chinn and the Walk and Bike organization like shoelaces, stickers, and healthy snacks.

### From the Nurse...Flu Vaccines

Per the Center for Disease Control, everyone six months of age and older should get a yearly flu vaccine. Ample supplies of influenza vaccine are now available. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for your body to develop an immune response. Get vaccinated now so that you will be protected when flu season begins. In the United States, influenza season usually begins in October and can last until May. In Oregon we've had our first reported flu related hospitalization, so I encourage you to get

vaccinated today! The nasal spray is indicated for healthy, non-pregnant persons aged 2-49 years.

In addition to getting immunized, it's also important to ward off the flu and other viruses and bacteria by these methods:

- Protect yourself and others by washing your hands often.
- Cover your mouth and nose with something other than your hand when you cough or sneeze.

### FROM THE NURSE: Head Lice



Schools are no longer required to send home notices to families when cases of lice are brought to their attention. Still, we wanted to inform you that there have been some recent cases among children at school. As such, you may wish to monitor your child for head lice a little more frequently in the coming weeks. Screen all household members

close to scalp line for nits (lice eggs) and for live lice. Use really good lighting and pay close attention to area behind ears and at nape of neck. Pictures are available at the web site <a href="http://identify.us.com">http://identify.us.com</a>. If in doubt, or you see nits, please consult with your health care provider, school health clinic, or school nurse. Look for tear shaped, yellowish eggs firmly glued to the hair shaft. See diagram below from the CDC website <a href="https://www.dpd.cdc.gov">www.dpd.cdc.gov</a>. Nits are tiny, smaller than the head of a straight pin.

Treatment Suggestions for Controlling Head Lice from 4J Health Services are also available.
